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


Singles Meet to "Leave Their Mark"

Most young people in their 20s and 30s are thinking of the robust years ahead of them. HFBA's Young Leadership group, rallied by Rabbi Allen Schwartz of Congregation Ohab Zedek of Manhattan, turned their thoughts to the end of life at a special dessert reception hosted by organization president Gerald E. Feldhamer, and his wife, Karin.

Admission to the party, which was held on February 24th, was by more than invitation. Every person in the room joined our "Leave Your Mark" project, sponsoring at least one marker that will be placed over an unmarked grave in Mt. Richmond Cemetery. The enthusiastic response of the Upper West Side singles at the event has helped HFBA come closer to its goal of placing simple monuments over every unmarked grave in the cemetery.

The young people were visibly moved by Rabbi Schwartz's remarks about the importance of having a tangible indicator of who is buried in each grave. Rabbi Schwartz's personal donation of five markers, dedicated to the memory of those in his father's family who died in the Holocaust, encouraged each participant to do the maximum possible for HFBA.



Svetlana Dragoy died in a tragic car accident while on vacation with a friend. The New York resident and mother of two was a passenger in a car that went off a bridge in Russelville, Arkansas, and was killed instantly. But thanks to the Hebrew Free Burial Association, her family was not stranded in its time of need.

Svetlana and her mother Rozalia are recent immigrants to the United States. Mrs. Rozalia's misery was compounded by the fact that she did not have enough money to transport her daughter's body from Arkansas, where it lay in a local mortuary, to New York. How could she bring her daughter home and provide her with a Jewish burial?

When Rozalia Dragoy first came to us, she was panicked. The cost of a funeral, plot and burial were more than she could imagine saving in a decade. But even if she could afford a bare bones funeral, she would need to lay out several thousand dollars for transporting her daughter's body before she could even begin to bury her.

Our staff members immediately began

making arrangements for her daughter's funeral. However, there was still the problem of transporting the body and paying the Arkansas mortuary where Ms. Dragoy's remains were stored.

As you might expect, those fees were paid by the Hebrew Free Burial Association. On August 26, Rozalia Dragoy was able to lay her daughter to rest, surrounded by her family, friends and the caring environment of the HFBA.

The sad story of Svetlana Dragoy illustrates both the need for the HFBA and for the generous contributions of our friends and supporters. The vast majority of our burials are relatively simple to arrange and execute. We know in advance how much they will cost. But when a case like Svetlana's arrives, we must have the ability to go beyond, to reach deep into our pockets and do whatever we must to ensure that an indigent Jew can be buried in a Jewish cemetery.

Thankfully, situations like these don't occur too often. When they do arise, I am thankful once again that we have friends like you to whom we can turn, so that people like Rozalia Dragoy can continue to turn to us.



Dear Mr. Feldhamer:

It is with profound appreciation that I write this letter.

Last Sunday my penniless sister died in a New York convalescent hospital. While I tried to seek help from California, the social worker, Lori Denton, told me about the Hebrew Free Burial Association.

In less than an hour, Mrs. Leist called me in California to make final arrangements. Her kind yet vigilant attention allowed me to make immediate arrangements for a flight to New Jersey. During my hasty and tearful departure, I had visions of my kind and forgiving sister being buried in a squalid pauper's field in a deteriorated area of New York, Knowing myself, I would have carried this pain with me for the rest of my life. I have always expected perfection from myself, no matter what my station in life at the time.

Upon meeting Rabbi Shmuel Plafker at this graceful, reverent place called Mt. Richmond Cemetery, I found immediate peace. I couldn't express my gratitude eloquently enough to Rabbi Plafker for the blessed service he is performing with your organization.

I have lived in California for 30 years, where everything is based upon wealth, even among Jews. This experience with your organization and Rabbi Plafker have validated my Jewish roots and the substance of our magnificent religion.
